In the News

- Governor Healey's proposed FY25 MA State Budget included:
 - \$25M to fully fund HIP
 - \$170M for Universal School Meals (though more is still needed)
 - \$150M for Regional Transit Authorities (RTAs)
 - Learn more: check out the Governor's <u>FY25 budget briefs</u>
- In December, the MA Legislature passed and the Governor signed a
 "Supplemental Budget" that included \$6M to restore critical state SNAP
 benefits for legally-present immigrants who are barred from federal

A SUCCESSFUL SUMMIT

On January 25th, MWFC hosted our 2nd Annual Food Access Summit at the Hudson Town Hall. This year's Summit focused on the critical issue of food insecurity among older adults in our communities, with speakers spanning our federal and state legislators, state agencies, and area providers. 





MWFC WORKING GROUP UPDATES

HEALTHY FOOD ACCESS

Last year, we developed printable Food
Resource Fliers listing pantries and meal
programs for all eight MetroWest
municipalities, in collaboration with the area
providers who run these programs. They
were initially available in three languages English, Spanish, and Portuguese, and we
have now been able to add a fourth
language: Haitian Creole! This was made
possible thanks to funding from last year's
earmarks secured by Speaker Pro Tempore
Hogan and Senate President Spilka and
grants from the MetroWest Health
Foundation & the Sudbury Foundation.

**A note about SNAP benefits for legally-present MA immigrants: the projected cost in FY25 for these nutrition benefits is between \$12-18M. We are urging the Governor and the MA Legislature to adequately fund this critical nutrition benefit.

2 Thank your Legislators

Let the Healey administration know you are excited about the \$25 million to fully fund HIP, \$170 million for Universal School Meals, and \$150 million for RTA operating costs included in the proposed FY25 MA State Budget - and call for even stronger funding for school meals and equitable programming.

Bonus: thank your state legislators if they helped advocate for this funding, while urging them to support a budget that fully funds these programs.

3 Spread HIP Awareness

To ensure that the Healthy Incentives Program (HIP) remains a state funding priority, we need to keep raising awareness about the program's benefits - from promoting accessible fresh produce for all SNAP users to supporting local farms.

Here's how you can help:

- Download and share our <u>educational flyers</u>.
- Invite your legislator to join you at a market to see HIP in action. Even though it's winter now, the Natick farmers market is open year round!
- Keep urging your legislators to fully fund this program and to support <u>S.85/H.150</u>.
